THE CHALLENGES OF MANAGING THE FINAL DESIGN OF THE GROUND WATER REPLENISHMENT SYSTEM PROJECT

The Groundwater Replenishment (GWR) System is an indirect potable water reuse project jointly sponsored by the Orange County Water District (OCWD) and the Orange County Sanitation District (OCSD). These two public agencies currently serve 2.2 million people Orange County. The GWR System will supplement existing water supplies by providing a new, reliable, high-quality source of water to recharge the Orange County Groundwater Basin (the Basin) and protect the Basin from further degradation due to seawater intrusion. By recycling water, it will also provide peak wastewater flow disposal relief and postpone the need for OCSD to construct a new ocean outfall by diverting treated wastewater flows that would otherwise be discharged to the Pacific Ocean.

Located in central Orange County, the project will extend from Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley, and Costa Mesa near the Pacific Ocean coast to Santa Ana, Orange, and Anaheim generally along the Santa Ana River. The GWR System will consist of three major components: (1) Advanced Water Treatment facilities (including microfiltration, reverse osmosis, and UV light) and pumping stations; (2) a major pipeline connecting the treatment facilities to existing recharge basins; and (3) expansion of an existing seawater intrusion barrier.

Implementation of the GWR System will be phased. Phase 1, which is currently under final design, will produce 70 mgd of reclaimed water. The total project cost for Phase 1 is estimated at \$352 million and the operation and maintenance cost is \$22 million per year. The current schedule calls for Phase 1 to begin operation in the Spring of 2005. Future phases are planned to expand the capacity of the GWR System to over 130 mgd of treated water, as anticipated demands for recycled water are realized. These demands would include a drought proof supply of high quality waster for industrial uses. When completed, the GWR System will be the largest recycling project of its type in the world, ultimately treating over 170 mgd of secondary effluent.

The presentation will discuss this major Orange County water supply project and the project management challenges of the Camp Dresser & McKee (CDM) consultant team that is performing the final design. These challenges include: managing a multi-discipline engineering

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THE PRESIDENT'S COLUMN



GROWING UP

Project Management is coming of age. PMI has come from an obscure association with just a few thousand members in the 90s, to an organization with over 75,000 members world wide. Growth is good. However, it also brings the need to more structure. This month's column will highlight some of the structures that are being put in place by PMI Headquarters.

Policies

This month I received a Component Policies Manual from Headquarters. The part of me that likes order, and likes to know

where things stand, really appreciates having everything in one place. Of course, the side of me that doesn't like being told what to do, immediately resented it. Some of the highlights of the policies are:

- Membership and Prospect Database Information
- Use of PMI Intellectual Property
- Web Site Guidelines
- Component Awards

Charter

Also, during this month the revised version of the Chartering Document came out. Some of you may remember that when this was first released it caused quite a commotion. Many of the components were upset that they had not been consulted, and felt that the Charter was very one-sided towards headquarters. The revised Charter takes into consideration many of the recommendations from chapters and members. Below are some points of interest that have been summarized. This information is not represented verbatim, nor in entirety.

PMI agrees to perform the following functions:

- Develop policies
- Process membership, collect dues, distribute membership data PMI reserves the following rights:
- The sole right to represent PMI
- The sole right to promulgate PM standards, certify PM Professionals, accredit or recognize training programs and providers, conduct other PMI-identified and PMI-prepared organization-wide activities
- Components may not develop, engage in, endorse or sponsor programs, services, products or other activities that may be confused with, detract from or damage the common and standardized products, programs, service and other activities that PMI may develop in the areas of project management standards; professional certification programs; and accreditation under the name of and with the resources from PMI.

Component Status and Relationship

- Components shall be independently incorporated and registered as a separate and distinct legal entity. The component shall conduct its affairs in its own name, and shall not represent itself, directly or indirectly as being PMI. The component shall not expressly or indirectly advertise, promote or communicate that the Component's programs, services, or activities are sponsored or endorsed by PMI, unless authorized in writing by the PMI Executive Director.

Component Use of PMI Membership Information

Any information pertaining to membership, including, but not limited to, databases, lists, mailing labels and reports may only be used in the lawful business of the Component.

CORPORATE ADVISORY BOARD UPDATE

The Corporate Relations Committee is hosting the June 2001 Corporate Advisory Board (CAB) meeting on Friday, 22 June 2001 at the UCI Learning Center. The focus of this meeting is to recap the vision/mission discussions to date, discuss the PMI-OC corporate sponsorship proposal, and conduct team building exercise to help the CAB team function better as a team. The CAB is formed to organize and direct program planning activities that the PMI-OC corporate sponsors are interested in. PMI-OC continues to recruit corporate, education, and government organizations that are interested in associating with PMI to advance the project management profession.

To date, the CAB has representatives from the Newport Corporation, EDS, Boeing, OCTA, Fluor, UCI Extension, Logicon, CSC, and SCE participating. The CAB team agreed on a vision statement: "Increase the value of project management to member organizations." The team also agreed on four objectives: (1) Demonstrate the tangible benefits of project management, (2) Provide synergy between corporate objectives and PMI, (3) Gain insight to the strategic future of project management, and (4) Nurture a project management learning environment for CAB members. Individual CAB members have provided suggested actions on how to meet the four objectives.

The Corporate Relations Committee developed the PMI-OC Corporate Sponsorship Proposal made up of corporate sponsor

responsibilities, corporate sponsor benefits, and CAB organization structure. Corporate sponsors are required to make financial and or service-in-kind contributions, have a minimum number of PMI-OC members and provide volunteers to assist with PMI-OC and CAB sponsored events. For these contributions, PMI-OC corporate sponsors will enjoy reduced rates at PMI-OC and/or CAB sponsored events, special services provided by PMI-OC available only to corporate sponsors, recommendation to the PMI Leadership Institute, free advertising spots on PMI-OC communication channels, and opportunity to direct professional development programs, hosted by PMI-OC/CAB, of interest to corporate sponsors. Finally, the CAB is made up of PMI-OC corporate sponsors on a rotation basis and PMI-OC board members and Corporate Relations Committee members.

Both the CAB and the PMI-OC Board of Directors are reviewing this proposal. And, the CAB will now begin to shift its focus on program planning for next year. Through the VP Corporate Relations, the CAB hopes to coordinate its year 2002 program planning activities with the PMI-OC VP Programs and VP Professional Development. We hope to provide some major year 2002 professional development programs of general interest to PMI-OC members as well as PMI-OC corporate sponsors.
