PROJECT LEADERSHIP: TIME TO BRING IN THE COACH

The mantra for survival today is to constantly improve project performance. We need magical end products and we need them faster and cheaper. The answer is simple. 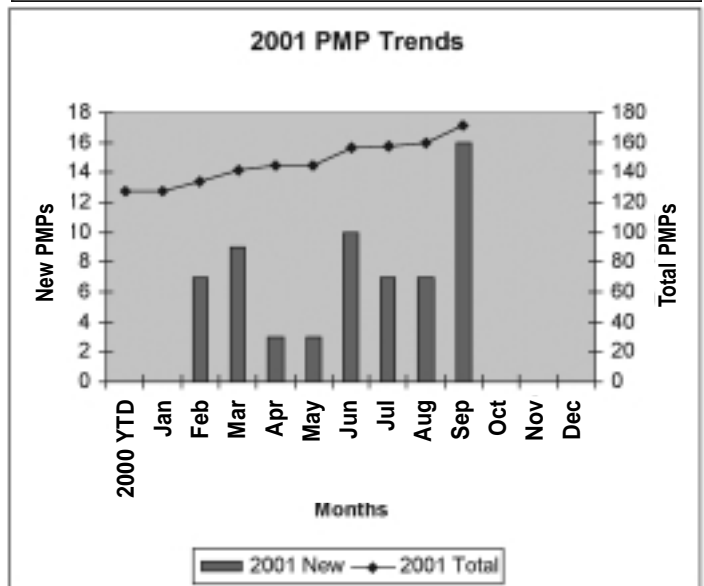
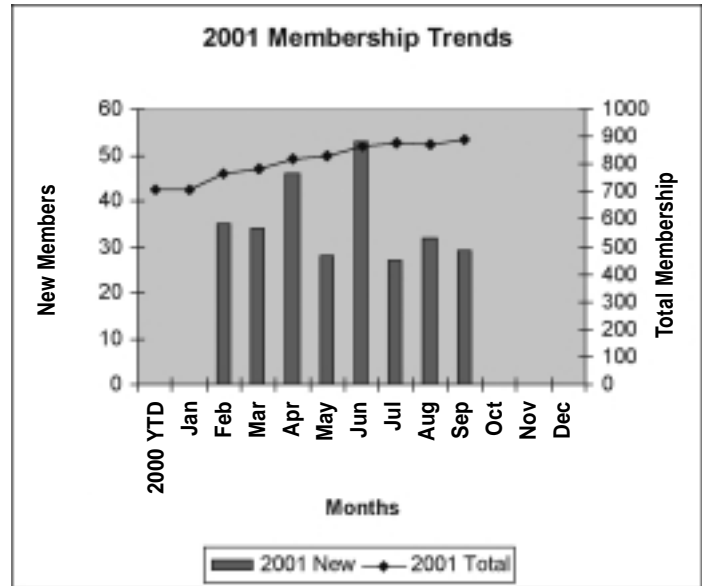

Candidates for the PMP® Certification Examination were previously notified that an additional performance domain, Professional Responsibility, was scheduled for inclusion on the Certification Exam beginning 15 September 2001. Unfortunately, a software-related bug was discovered by Prometric during the final testing which has required the implementation of this new examination version to be postponed. As a result, the existing exam and domains (initiating, planning, executing, controlling and closing) will continue in use, both inside and outside North America, at least until 31 December 2001, and until such time as we are able to provide sixty (60) days notice. Cyndi joined the Orange County chapter in 1998. In 1999 she became involved in the Board Meetings and was elected to the VP Communications in 2000. In 2001 she was elected to the position of VP Operations. However, due to work and family conflicts with the President-elect, she was asked to take over the position of President. During her time on the Board she has been on the Leadership Planning Committee and the Core Team for the IS SIG Professional Development Seminar.

Goals for 2002

My goals for 2002 are to continue to refine the infrastructure we have put in place in 2001 and to expand the Orange County Chapter's circle of influence.

With regards to the infrastructure, we are very close to implementing the ability to take credit card registration. I will continue to support the VP Finance in completing this objective. I will also support the VP Operations in standardizing policies for the chapter. These are objectives that were begun in 2001 and are almost complete, but need a few finishing touches.

As far as expanding our circle of influence, thus far I am thinking of three ways to do this:

2. Establish relationships with associations that have similar or related interests. There are some opportunities to establish other strategic relationships and/or hold some joint events with associations that have a shared membership base with PMI.
3. Create a project management education program for school age children. With project management developing into its own

profession we can serve the future of the profession by educating youth and teens about some of the basic principles. These principles will help students in projects from applying to college, preparing for finals and taking on leadership roles in their schools.

Each of these three initiatives can be fairly significant. Therefore I am asking volunteers who are interested in participating in these areas to come to the planning meeting on November 10th to help shape the future of our chapter.

Requester is a PMI-OC chapter member, and the PMI member number will be used to log borrowed books. All PMI-OC books are available on a first-come first-serve basis and are free of charge. Any book is loaned for a month and can be extended for one more month (a total of 2 months). If a book has a reservation, the book cannot be extended and must be returned on the

due date. A book reservation could be made, and the book is available as soon as it is returned. A late book return fee will be applied. The late fee is \$1 per week until it is returned. A damage or lost book will be charged at 75% of the book's purchase price.

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Good News! The PMI® 2002 Regular Individual Membership Dues will remain at \$119.00 (US). After reviewing the prior year's actual performance in maintaining the balance of dues against member services expenses, no increase in regular dues is indicated for 2002. Also, as recommended by the Dues Project Action Team (PAT), the PMI Board of Directors approved alignment of student and retiree dues to the existing Dues Policy. Therefore, beginning 1 January 2002, student dues will be 25 percent of regular dues, or equivalent to \$30.00 (US) and the retiree rate will be 50 percent, or equivalent to \$60.00 (US). Additionally, as recommended by the PAT and approved by the Board, a Hardship Provision will become part of PMI's Dues Policy effective 1 January 2002. This provision recognizes the possibility that the circumstances of our members could change at any time and PMI should provide an opportunity for them to continue to participate in the Institute.
