Moving Forward and Providing Value

The two benefits that members rank most highly in all of our chapter surveys are networking and PDUs. These benefits were translated into board objectives for 2011. So, in September, we held the annual chapter conference. Final counts aren't yet available; however, we estimate that between 140 and 160 people attended the event and earned up to four PDUs.

Our outstanding keynote speaker, Matt Brauning, presented his vision of the personnel issues affecting our profession. We enlisted Frank Parth. a member of

the PMI® Global Board of Directors, who presented an overview of project management in our ever increasingly complex business environment.

Other speakers earned additional PDUs presenting their topics. Still more volunteers earned PDUs by contributing time and effort to the conference. Attendees enjoyed multiple networking opportunities between the sessions and during the buffet dinner.

We also launched our Fall PMP® Prep Workshop in September. While smaller in size than anticipated, we still feel that we provide an outstanding value, in both cost and preparation for the PMP exam.

On the same Saturday, we also held our monthly advanced topic seminar, where chapter members and other professionals volunteer to serve as presenters. Attendance is holding steady at this event, and our members can earn four PDUs cheaply and at a single event each month.

In terms of outreach and social networking, we launched our Facebook site. Attendees at the annual chapter conference were encouraged to post comments on the site. In addition, I see new threads and discussions coming from our LinkedIn site each

week, encouraging communication between our members.

At the end of the month, we will launch our web-based learning site, offering PDUs without having to physically attend a chapter event. This new feature promises PDUs at a low cost. Close on the heels of this endeavor is a podcast based PDU event, again offering our members the chance to earn PDUs at their leisure.

Finally, nominations are open for people desiring to sit on the PMI-OC Board of Governors. Board members lead the chapter on its evolution as a viable partner with businesses and project managers in Orange County. If you're looking for expanded internal and external networking opportunities, a position on the board or on one of our many committees offers tremendous potential.

If you have ideas for other ways we can support your needs, please let us know. We are open to exploring new ideas, growing the chapter, and meeting the members' needs.



This month there were two speakers. The first, Frank Parth from the PMI® Board of Directors, was followed by Matt Brauning, our keynote speaker. Matt is founder and **CEO of Evolution Seminars.**

Between the two addresses, our president, Stephen June, recognized the event project manager, Li Shen Tan, for her outstanding effort in bringing the conference to fruition.



Project Management as a Strategic Competency



Frank Parth, PMP, PMI® Board member, PMI-OC Fellow, and a long time PMI-OC member, discussed the evolution of the project management discipline and the strategic benefits of sound project management practices.

Frank also reported on the status of the next PMBOK[®] update and coming improvements for the volunteering process, which is critical to the success of PMI.

The Project Management Institute has developed over the past 40 years, with nearly exponential membership growth in the last 20 years, reflecting the importance of standard and widely accepted management practices to modern organizations as they compete in today's markets.





The rapid ascent of information technology has proven to be a strategic enabler of project management, as well as an area of focus in itself. Information technology is also getting more emphasis in the PMBOK® and via the **PMI Agile Certified Practitioner** certification.

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Matt Brauning

presented an introduction to the concept of Spiral Dynamics, which is based on the work of Don Beck, Clare Graves, and others.

Spiral Dynamics' first tier framework is based on six color-coded stages, or systems, of human behavior: beige for survival, purple for tribal, red for power gods, blue for authority, orange for achievement, and green for community.

In the second tier, is the seventh stage, called Flex Flow, where the first tier systems are naturally flowing and adaptable to change.

People are not categorized solely as one particular color or exhibit the behavior of only one system. But when a person is focused on one stage, they may not see the benefits of the other stages. Of the many potential problems on a project, people conflicts can be the most prevalent.

To overcome these, managers would benefit from being aware of differing dominant systems in their employees and approach them differently in order to achieve project goals.



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
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Managing for **DOLLARS**

STRATEGIES FOR MAXIMIZING VIRTUAL TEAM EFFECTIVENESS

On September 10, **DIane Altwies, PMP**

was the speaker at our advanced topic seminar,

An author of books and material guiding budding and seasoned project managers through the PMP[®] and CAPM[®] examinations. Diane is an accomplished project manager and speaker. She has a strong background in finance, marketing, management information systems, and production, which she has used effectively to deliver projects in software development involving multi-disciplinary teams.

Diane addressed one of the most important parts of project management: keeping the costs in control.

A key component of the project charter, the business document that drives the objectives of a project, is the need to reflect reality. Diane stressed the importance of having periodic conversations with stakeholders to help clarify objectives, especially in times of changing project scenarios.

Managing requirements is an important step of project control.



An organized approach in identifying and documenting requirements is needed.

Diane explained some simple approaches to managing requirements and presented a template to list them to help clarify requirements, prioritize, and finally know when you are done with the project.

Further, requirements need to be validated by various techniques such as testing, client reviews, and prototyping. It is important to recognize the importance of allocation of a budget for this validation.

Change is an inevitable reality, and steps need to be in place to control change. This change can be driven not only by new stakeholder requirements, but also by time.

Budgets to account for change in technology over time should be a part of risk management and need to be taken care of by a suitable contingency allowance.

The key is to define priorities when planning for contingencies.

Change control must be exercised at all levels during a project. This mechanism is an important tool to manage client

expectations and is one of the best tools at the disposal of the project manager.

An interesting facet of Diane's presentation was tracking changes that were rejected or those that were not being processed for various reasons. These exclusions have the potential of turning into positive change orders in the long run.

Diane identified a good project management trait, application of an interactive approach and use of good interviewing skills to facilitate conversation, preserve the focus of meetings, and aid the relationship building process. These skills also help in identifying stakeholder's hot buttons.

One of the key communication modes of a dispersed team, a common project model today, is teleconferencing. Such meetings have the advantage of reducing travel time and costs and promote multi-tasking.

Nevertheless, it is important to have the right participants on the call. Ground rules should be laid down, and summarizing the meeting at the end of the call will get the team on the same unambiguous page.

The presentation flowed well tion.

At frequent points during the session, she presented best practices in various activities, using PowerPoint handouts. Group exercises promoted sharing and interaction and evoked many questions which were answered by not only Diane, but also through dialogue within the group.

The lively presentation was supplemented by an equally spontaneous and participative audience. They were linked by common concerns: managing budgets, teams, and stakeholder expectations.
