



Is Project Management a Dying Profession?

 According to a recent report by Project Management International, the global economy will need an additional 25 million Project Managers by 2030, suggesting continual demand in the industry

To meet this target, 2.3 million Project Management Professionals will be needed to fill roles every year.

This does not account for the continual change in the workforce for retirements or career changers.

Why Project Management?

Organizations that employ trained Project Managers are **28% more productive** than those that don't

Project Management is the "art" of Organizing, Planning, Executing (Monitoring and Controlling), and <u>Delivering</u> Projects (<u>Goods, Services or Capabilities</u>) under various constraints, such as cost, time, and quality.

Pulls together the right people at the right time

Provides a **diverse skill set** that ranges across many disciplines

The main prerequisite for being a successful Project Manager is to acquire specific hard and soft skills:


- Requirements Understanding Development and Management

Success is measured by the ability to manage team dynamics on a daily basis and make business decisions that are bigger than just the project plan. Building a Team with the Right People to Create a High Performing Team

• Project success is based on the strength of a unified team



- It's important to build trust, safe spaces, and the opportunity for team members to make meaningful contributions
- Clear understanding of:

How are we all showing up as a team?

How are we working together towards a shared vision and common goal? What is my role vs. your role?

What tools and technologies do we have in place that we will use together to do our jobs?

As a team, do we have the technical expertise we need?

How are We Going to Communicate? The Importance of Stakeholder Engagement

- For your project to run well, you must understand your stakeholders and keep them informed
- Development of a Stakeholder Engagement plan is critical
 - Establish the guidelines for how the team is going to interact.
 - What are we communicating? To whom? When and how often?
 - What do I, and others, need to know?
 - Think about what layers of stakeholders you might be missing, like the 2nd and 3rd layer of partners that need to be involved, like the supply chain.



Why Do Projects Fail?

- A lack of trust among the team members
- Team **mis-alignment**
- Lack of transparency with project team and stakeholders
- The business case wasn't thorough or approved by the **right people**

Project tailoring wasn't employed, **scope creep** occurred, alternatives and **impacts** weren't considered

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- Collaboration with, and insights from, project managers working in many different industries
- UCI's cohort will help reskill, upskill, and level up a project managers expertise
- Provides the knowledge base to prepare for the PMP exam


